

A SPIRITUAL SAFARI

Summertime is in full swing now and before we know it, we'll be gearing up for back to school. With that comes Girls' Ministries Week in September and our new annual theme. First things first, though. Power Chicks '19 is upon us. By the time you get this issue, it will be about three weeks until the start of our fourth quadrennial girls event. It has been an honor for me to be part of the formation team that started it all in 2007 and to have watched it touch so many girls and leaders over the past 12 years.

Each event has had a different theme and a project that challenges us to reach beyond ourselves and help with a need somewhere around the world. When Summer Sneed accepted the invitation to be our



Saturday night speaker for Power Chicks, the Girls' Ministries Board chose Africa as the project to receive the funds raised at the auction and the offerings the churches are encouraged to bring. The theme was set with Africa in mind: WILD About God: A Spiritual Safari. The money raised will help fund girls conferences in Africa during 2020. We are sad to announce, however, that Summer Sneed has had to cancel her speaking commitment. I assure you, that will not deter our commitment to come alongside the girls in Africa. We want them to experience Christ and His love at girls retreats and conferences just as we do in the U.S. The Power Chicks theme and project will remain the same. The third quarter of 2019 also encompasses the Discipleship theme of Steadfast in Prayer. Everything we do must be grounded in prayer. Why?

In 2010, IPHC Girls' Ministries director, Irvina Parker, and her sister, Evelyn Harlow, felt God calling them to offer their time to conduct the first Girls' Ministries training in Nairobi, Kenya, before they traveled on to South Sudan for a medical missions trip. With no funds available from Girls' Ministries for the trip, it started as a personal commitment. It was the beginning of a ministry that has continued to expand and multiply under the capable leadership of Summer Sneed, IPHC missionary and director of Girls' Ministries in East Africa. During that first training, Summer acknowledged that God had called her to serve the girls. Region by region, He is putting His plan in place and girls are gathering to worship and honor Jesus Christ at conferences designed just for them. This most recent girls conference was held in Lilongwe, Malawi. Funding

for events of this nature is challenging for the missionaries with limited budgets. You can be sure that our funds will be used wisely!

SEIZING THOSE PIVOTAL MOMENTS

Whether you are a parent or a teacher, I am sure you can look back and recall moments in time that became powerful teaching moments. Or, perhaps you can think of a few times where you realized later that you missed the perfect opportunity to teach a valuable lesson.

Paul's instructions to the Christians in Thessalonica set a clear example for us regarding our Christian lifestyle. "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you" (1 Thessalonians 5:16-18, ESV). On the surface, those mandates seem like an impossible task, and humanly speaking, they are. Can I really rejoice when my car won't start and I'm late to my Girls' Ministries meeting? How do I pray while I'm on the clock at work? How do I give thanks when my circumstances have gone from bad to worse?

The answer to those questions comes directly from the words of Jesus Christ in Matthew 19:26 when he said, "With man this is impossible, but with God all things are possible" (NIV). Faith in God allows us to see beyond circumstances and believe for answers. I learned some of these lessons early on through life experiences that my parents used as pivotal teaching moments.

As the daughter of church planters, life had its challenges. My parents followed the call of God to several new locations to plant a church where

there was no P. H. church. Needless to say, no established church meant no salary compensation, no parsonage to live in, no guarantees on anything. When he had no car, my dad would hitchhike to his job of driving a school bus to help provide for his family. He and my mother relied fully on the fact that God turned impossibilities into possibilities. Prayer and faith were integral factors in daily life. They chose to involve me and my sisters in praying for our needs to be met. On more than one occasion, I can vividly recall them calling us together to pray for groceries. The pantry was bare and there was little or no food left for the next meal. We would pray together as a family and without fail, our prayers would be answered. Usually, it came as a knock on the door and we would find a bag of groceries and no one in sight. These faith building moments were incredible experiences for me.

While I am grateful that David and I never had to worry about where our next meal might come from, I had learned the importance of being involved in praying for answers. I did my best to seize any opportunity to involve our son and daughter in faith-building prayers. One of those "top-of-the-list moments" came early in 1989 when our 8-year-old son and 5-year-old daughter were watching Alvin and the Chipmunks (one of my personal favorites). I was working that morning in my home office and my son came to me in tears. In that episode, Alvin and the Chipmunks were traveling to Berlin. As the story played out, it showed how families had been divided by the wall. His heart was broken as he asked me if this was real. As we talked about the unfortunate events, I realized that God was giving me a great opportunity to turn this into a faith-building experience. We immediately prayed for those affected by the Berlin Wall and proceeded to pray over the few months on a regular basis.

Early on the morning of November 9, 1989, as I watched the morning news, they showed a breaking report of ordinary citizens knocking down the wall! I ran to Ryan's room to wake him up. I wanted him to see first-hand that God was answering his prayers. It was a powerful faith-building experience for him and his sister. Our prayers, combined with the prayers of untold hundreds, had touched the heart of God and we witnessed the results that morning. It was pretty neat too that their Grandpa was in Berlin during those days when the wall came down. The kids were able to hold a piece of the concrete that he had picked up from the crumbled wall.

Lesson plans are valuable tools for teachers. However, some of the most powerful lessons happen when you allow God to take over the moment and you follow His lead. Remind children that God's timing is perfect. When we were praying for food, the groceries almost always arrived in hours. However, not every prayer is answered immediately, so continue to pray for specific needs. Over the months, as we prayed for Berlin, we talked about Germany and learned about the culture that the war had created. It took months for us to see our prayers answered, but when it happened, we acknowledged it for what it was-the hand of God at work. We celebrated it!

If you use the Mpact and TGM curriculum, there are units on prayer in each age level and plenty of suggested activities in the resource sections. If you don't use that curriculum, look for books or articles. Check out the website for helps such as the Five-Finger Prayer and the ACTS guide (watch our website and Facebook page to see the one we have created for you using that acrostic). Emphasize that prayer is our way of having a conversation with God; it involves talking to him and listening to Him. Put legs to your prayers by doing a prayer walk around your church or nearby neighborhoods. Make a prayer wall in your classroom for prayer requests and answers. Decorate a prayer chair for children to sit in for special prayer. Help them see that prayer should be part of their daily lifestyle by using everyday occurrences as pivotal teaching experiences.

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KIDS APPS: FINDING THE RIGHT BALANCE!

AWARENESS:

Like it or not, technology and kids are synonymous. We must learn how to navigate the complex maze and find the right balance for our family. We live in a society where we are exposed to media without boundaries. Whether it's television, the cinema, news, entertainment, or music, it streams into our lives 24/7 and is often devoid of any filters. "Marching Off the Map," by Tim Elmore and Andrew McPeak point out that our young are exposed to so much adult information, "they lose (1) their sense of innocence, (2) their sense of wonder and (3) their sense of trust." Unfortunately, they point out, "this information does not necessarily translate into maturity." However, they are also quick to mention that as a society, we have lowered our standard for adult behavior. Ouch! "We want to look young, feel young, dress young, talk young, and act young," they say. "We argue with our children's teachers. We push our kid's coaches to get them special treatment. We're not good at delaying gratification, and we frequently don't keep commitments we make...very much like children.

CHALLENGE

We, as parents and leaders, must know how to combat the technology challenges AND how to benefit from them as we teach our children. We must learn how to use media to enhance our positive message whether it's about serving God or learning life skills. We must do this while undergoing a self-evaluation. What are we modeling?

HOW CAN TECHNOLOGY IMPACT LEARNING?

- A picture IS worth a thousand words. Studies show that imagery, connected with right-brain functions, greatly enhance learning over simple text. Retention increases as we add more senses to the process.
- In a study done by the authors of the book cited above, three preferred instruments emerged as students shared how they learned best: music, experiences, and images. You can quickly draw your own conclusions then as to how and why the correct apps could be very useful.
- Overload Warning: Our brains are not wired for all the data overload it receives. Studies show that the 24/7 deluge can lead to addictive lifestyles and high levels of stress. So, BALANCE is the key to proper learning.

FIND & TEST THE APPS

Find the apps for your own mobile device (or your child's if you have reached that point) that will reinforce the messages you want to teach. You can search for apps for kids that are inspirational, educational, or just for fun. We've given you links to a few below that are recommended from reputable sites. The secret is to test it first and read the reviews BEFORE you hand it over to your child. Some are free; some have fees.

WHERE ARE THEY NOW?

This is our third and final installment in the series, "Where Are They Now?" We are so proud of all of them and their accomplishments-both then and now. Erica (Radford) Campbell and Rachel Fenters were interns for Power Chicks '11. They were students from Emmanuel College at the time and part of their dance team. They helped wherever needed and performed a dance to the song "Mirrors" which reflected both of their testimonies of overcoming low self-esteem and lack of identity.

Erica graduated from Emmanuel in 2014 with a Bachelor of Science in the School of Christian Ministries. She and her husband Jon live on the

campus of Emmanuel College where he serves as the Director for Residence Life. They also serve with the Awakening as leaders for the Traditional Internship at Emmanuel College. Erica works at LifePoint Ministries as the Communications and



Events Coordinator. She serves as the Girls' Ministries Director for LifePoint and on the IPHC General Women's Ministries Board.

When we asked Erica about her favorite Power Chicks memory, she shared about the opportunity to pray with the girls at the altar. "I prayed with one young girl, Brianna, who just graduated from Emmanuel College," she recalls. "She remembered me praying with her and told me several times how much that prayer meant to her. She and I became close over her four years at EC, and for her Senior project she planned a women's conference at EC. It was an honor that she asked me to mentor her through the planning process. God is just so amazing how He brings relationships full circle and uses you in small ways that may slip your mind over the years but that were very impactful to that person in that moment."

She graduated from Edward Via College of Osteopathic Medicine in 2017 as a physician. She loves using her medical skills on missions trips and in volunteer work. On one specific trip to Honduras, the team saw over 900 patients, and 10% of them came to Christ! Rachel's missions

She had a highlight moment with IPHC missionary, Sharon Wooten. "As she was ministering to me," recalls Rachel, "she told me something that I will never forget: 'don't take things, personally. You are on God's mission. He has equipped you with a sword to spread His word to all the earth, but He will be your defense.' That has stuck with me through every season of my life."

We can't wait to see what God will do in the lives of our new group of interns, girls, and leaders as we come together again in Ridgecrest, North Carolina,

July 26-29, 2019! Power Chicks really is a life-changing experience for everyone!
