A Heart to Serve

As Christian women, we are called not just to believe, but to serve. Whether it's in our homes, churches, workplaces, or communities, God has uniquely gifted each of us for a purpose—not to be served, but to serve. Serving isn't about status or recognition; it's about surrender and love. It reflects the heart of Jesus. When we serve with joy and humility, we become His hands and feet in a broken world. Let's explore what it means to live with a servant's heart.

1) Serving Begins in the Heart

"Serve the Lord with Gladness! Come into His presence with singing!" - Psalm 100:2

God doesn't just care that we serve —He cares how we serve. Our attitude in service reflects the condition of our heart. We can be busy with good things but still miss the joy God intends if we're running on empty or doing it to impress

others. God delights in service that flows from a heart full of love and gratitude. When we're rooted in God's love, we serve with gladness, not grumbling.

Service is most meaningful when it's connected to our relationship with God. It becomes worship. Even simple, unseen tasks —like folding laundry, sending an encouraging text, or making a meal —can become holy acts when done unto Him.

2) Serving Reflects Jesus' Example

"For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give His life as a ransom for many." - Mark 10:45

Jesus didn't demand honor —He humbled Himself. He touched lepers, washed dirty feet, noticed the overlooked, and ultimately gave His life. This is the model He left us. When we choose to serve others —especially when it's inconvenient, unnoticed, or undeserved —we become a reflection of His love in action.

As women, it's easy to fall into comparison or wait for the "right platform" to serve. But the greatest opportunities often come in the ordinary: a kind word, a listening ear, a faithful commitment to the people God has placed in our lives. Christlike service is not self-seeking —it's self-giving.

3) Serving Uses Our Gifts for God's Glory

"Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms" - 1 Peter 4:10

God has given you unique gifts, experiences, and passions on purpose. You don't have to be like anyone else to serve effectively. Whether you're gifted in teaching, encouraging, organizing, creating, or helping behind the scenes, your gifts are tools for God's glory and the good of others.

When you step into your calling, you bless others, grow in spiritual maturity, and strengthen the Body of Christ. Don't underestimate the power of your "yes" to God. Your willingness to use your gifts—even when it stretches you—can have an eternal impact.

Serving is not about striving —it's about surrendering. When we serve from a place of love, we mirror the heart of Jesus to a world in need. You don't need a platform, title, or perfect life. You simply need to be available. God delights in using willing women to accomplish eternal things through ordinary moments.

Conversation Starters

- 1.) What's your current posture in serving? Is there joy, or has it become a chore?
- 2.) Are you willing to follow Jesus into humble places of service, even when it's hard or unseen?
- 3.) What has God placed in your hands? Are you using it, or holding back because of fear, comparison, or doubt?

Call to Action

- 1.) Pause today and pray for a renewed heart of gladness in your areas of service. Ask God to remind you that you're ultimately serving Him, not just people.
- 2.) Do one act of hidden service today. It could be praying for someone silently, cleaning something no one else notices, or going the extra mile without being asked. Let Jesus be your motivation.
- 3.) Write down one gift, talent, or passion you know God has given you. Ask Him to show you a specific way to use it to serve someone this week—in your home, church, or community.

Commit to serving the Lord in humility, joy, and gladness in every aspect of your life. May you reflect His character through your heart to serve.
